TRAVELING NARRATING COMPARING

Comparing plays an important role in the dynamic processes of knowledge-production and circulation in travel narratives. This conference focuses on the relation between traveling and comparing regarding travel accounts in and from the Americas between the 18th to the 20th century.

The symposium draws attention to forms and practices of travel narratives that include both imaginary voyages by authors such as Fenimore Cooper and Jules Verne as well as ethnographic writings by Henri Michaux and Claude Lévi-Strauss. As all genres of travel literature construct complex narratives, they come to open up and cross multiple and diverse epistemic fields.

The international conference wants to initiate a transdisciplinary dialogue between scholars who do research on different narratives and genres of travel literature in various languages, and scholars who study situations of cultural contact and/ or historiographies of travel; this dialogue will be centered on the overarching topic of practices of comparing.
