# THE MAKING OF MANKIND: TRACING RACE & RACISM

Whether in natural sciences, social and human sciences or humanities, race as a concept or central category has been widely contested and criticized. But the construction of race is a crucial part in the processes of making mankind. As an analytical category, it is intertwined with the emergence of disciplines in their respective epistemological contexts (e.g. "scientific racism"). The interdisciplinary conference will discuss connections to related discourses such as law, medicine, and health as well as philosophy. Furthermore, consequences such as structural racism, e.g. in education, will be examined.

The Annual Seminar is a renowned conference format of the Bielefeld Graduate School in History and Sociology (BGHS). In cooperation with the Collaborative Research Center (SFB) 1288 "Practices of Comparing" international researchers at an early point in their careers will present their work on the construction of race and racism in an interdisciplinary framework.

A special part of the conference will be the artistic confrontation with *race* and *racism* by Diana Ejaita and Ojudun Taiwo Jacob on Friday evening.
